Teaching in Guatemala: Practice, Participation and Professors

With supplies purchased through individual donations, I spent January 6-16, 2017, in Guatemala working with educators and children to promote more active science education. Cheryl Weeks-Rosten, another Midlander and the education coordinator for HELPS International, accompanied me and coordinated the trip. HELPS is a Texas-based non-profit with no religious affiliation that provides stoves, water filters, education, agronomy support and medical assistance to the people of Guatemala and other locations. HELPS organized transportation, food, lodging, translation and in-country connections.

The week began with four full days at the rural HELPS school in Santa Avelina, where six lessons appropriate for the pre K-6 student body were taught to teachers and students, and then taught BY the local educators to their peers and new groups of children. This program allowed teachers to gauge student reaction and connect with the

topics; their confidence was greatly improved through this opportunity. Our discussions about microbiology also led to securing a donation of hot air dryers for hand-washing to reduce the spread of germs.

Through Dr. Adrian Gil, a contact provided in 2015 by ACS, another full-day workshop for teachers and teacher candidates was also arranged at the University of Guatemala at del Valle (Altiplano). The new supplies were purchased for this hands-on program, in which 31 teachers (including University professors) participated. The reception was very positive; the supplies and write-ups in Spanish were left

behind to sustain the training. An invitation has already been extended for future (longer) teaching programs.

The experience was exhausting but very rewarding; the assistance of HELPS cannot be overstated, including the provision of two young interpreters who also had a very busy and challenging week!

Full Reporting of ACS Election Results

The results of the recent ACS election (*C&EN*, Nov. 7, 2016, p 7) reported vote counts for elections of President-Elect, Directors of Districts II and IV, and one of the Directors-at-Large (Schulz). The vote count/s for the election of the other Director-at-Large (Phillips) was not reported. This election of Directors-at-Large is one that involves the recently enacted preferential voting procedure because two candidates were elected. The vote counts for the three rounds of vote counting that are shown in *C&EN* show how Schulz was elected by a majority of the voters, but the following steps showing how Phillips was elected are not shown. The next step in the vote counting should involve adding the second-choice votes on the ballots where Schulz was the first-choice to the first-choices for the three remaining candidates. Subsequent steps, if needed, would show how one of the three remaining candidates (Phillips) achieved a majority of the votes.

A poster paper detailing the reporting of the results of this election and problems with reporting other preferential ACS elections will be submitted for the Fall Scientific Meeting later this year.

Announcing the 2017 Spring Awards Banquet and Call for Nominations

It is that time of year again when we have the opportunity to recognize outstanding educators, volunteers, and colleagues. I am asking that you take the time and nominate that outstanding person and have them recognized at the American Chemical Society-Midland Section Spring Awards Banquet at the Great Hall and Convention Center in Midland on Wednesday, May 3, 2017. The awards banquet is a great way to connect with others in the industry, those who have gone before us, those who teach the next generation, and those who will be following in our footsteps.

The process of nominating can be fun and easy. Consider getting your colleagues together for lunch and putting together a packet. If you are in a managerial role and are worried about favoritism, consider nominating 2-3 qualified persons (you will remain anonymous). If you feel you deserve an award but everyone is just too busy to notice, consider leaving suggestions or have an outright discussion with your manager. If you are a parent: Does your child have a great science teacher? If so, consider nominating him/her.

From personal experience, if you know the deserving person, it only takes 1 hour to put together an award-winning letter and an additional 15 minutes soliciting supporting letters. Think of what it will mean to that person and how good you will feel about your good deed. I have listed previous award recipients in the [January 2017 issue](#) of *The Midland Chemist* and would like to remedy that frequent “No Recipient” comment, as there is surely someone deserving in every category.

When you realize how exciting it is to nominate someone at the local level and you want to do more, I invite you to peruse the veritable cornucopia of awards the American Chemical Society offers at the national level. The criteria and deadlines for National ACS awards, and other grants and considerations, can be found at <http://www.acs.org/content/acs/en/funding-and-awards/awards/national/nominations.html>.

Nomination packets for all awards (except outstanding high school and collegiate awards) must, at a minimum, consist of a current resume or equivalent, and at least one supporting letter in addition to your letter of nomination, all stating why the nominee is deserving of the award with specific examples of professional involvement/growth, contributions to industry, and outside affiliations.

It is highly recommended that the nomination include a publications and patent list where applicable and additional letters of support which can come from students, parents, community members, and/or administrators. An example nomination letter can be requested from the awards chair via e-mail. Nominees must not have received the same award that they are being nominated for within the past 10 years. Nominations not meeting the minimum requirements, and submissions received after the April 1, 2017 deadline, will not be considered.

For those of you sequestered in labs who feel you might not be able to attend unless you nominate someone, I say save the date and come on out for a night of food, fun, and fraternization! Watch for more detailed information right here in *The Midland Chemist*!

Call for Nominations: 2017 Teaching, Volunteer, Education, Chemical Sciences Awards

Each year, the Midland Section of the American Chemical Society presents awards to recognize outstanding achievement in the chemical sciences. Nominations for the 2017 awards are invited for the following areas:

- Outstanding Elementary Level Science Teaching
- Outstanding Middle Level Science Teaching
- Outstanding High School Chemistry Teaching
- Outstanding College Chemistry Teaching
- Science Education Volunteer of the Year
- Outstanding Achievement and Promotion of the Chemical Sciences
- Outstanding Service to the American Chemical Society
- Outstanding Chemical Technician
- Outstanding High School / College Chemistry Students

Outstanding Science / Chemistry Teaching Awards

Candidates for the teaching awards must be educators at schools in the five-county geographical area of the Midland Section: Bay, Gratiot, Isabella, Midland and Saginaw Counties. One candidate will be recognized for their teaching contributions in each of the following categories: Elementary, Middle Level, High School, and College.

Science Education Volunteer of the Year

The Science Education Volunteer of the Year award is presented to an individual who makes a substantial contribution to science learning in the Midland Section through voluntary efforts.

Outstanding Achievement and Promotion of the Chemical Sciences

Each year the Midland Section honors an individual residing within the Section's geographical area who has demonstrated outstanding achievement and promotion of the chemical sciences. This award recognizes dedication and service to the chemical profession, but the recipient need not be an ACS member.

Outstanding Service to the American Chemical Society

The Section sponsors an annual award to recognize outstanding service to the Midland Section of the ACS. This award recognizes achievement in the promotion of the goals and objectives of the Society. Nominees shall be members of the Midland Section. Nominations should include a history of service to the Midland Section, and supporting letters from fellow ACS members.

Outstanding Chemical Technician

The Section presents an annual Outstanding Chemical Technician Award to an individual who has demonstrated an extremely high degree of professionalism as a chemical technician. Nominees must have worked for five years as a chemical technician, or in a related field, and whose primary job includes conducting experimentation or correlating information to help solve chemical problems or discover new chemical knowledge. The nominee must have successfully completed a two-year post-high school level chemistry curriculum leading to an associate degree, the equivalent course in a baccalaureate program, or equivalent experience. Chemical technicians do not need to be an ACS member to be eligible for this award.

Nominations should include outside affiliations. *Request the National ACS nomination form from the awards chair to nominate in this category.*

Recipients of all awards will be selected by the Awards Committee with the exception of the Outstanding Achievement and Promotion of the Chemical Sciences award which is submitted to the Midland Section ACS Executive Committee for approval. Nominators should write a letter indicating the award and describing the attributes of the candidate.

Nomination packets for all awards (except outstanding high school and collegiate awards) must, at a minimum, consist of a current resume or equivalent, and at least one additional supporting letter included with your nomination all stating why the nominee is deserving of the award. Specific examples should be given in areas such as professional involvement/growth, contributions to industry, and outside affiliations. It is highly recommended that the nomination include a publications and patent list where applicable. Additional letters of support can come from students, parents, community members, and/or administrators.

The deadline for nominations is Saturday, April 1, 2017. Nominations not meeting the minimum requirements, and submissions received after the April 1 deadline, will not be considered. Mail or fax submissions are acceptable; *electronic (e-mail) submissions are preferred.* All submissions must be accompanied by the name, position, address and phone number of the nominator.

Outstanding High School / College Chemistry Students

The Awards Committee also recognizes outstanding chemistry students at the high school and collegiate levels. Those students should be selected by their respective departments, and their names forwarded to the Awards Committee using the form attached to this call for nominations. One selection per school; no supporting letters needed.

Award recipients as well as Chemistry Olympiad winners and Fifty/Sixty/Seventy Year ACS Members will be honored at the 2017 ACS Spring Recognition Dinner at the Great Hall and Convention Center, in Midland, on Wednesday, May 3, 2017. LaTrease Garrison, Executive Vice President of the Education Division of the American Chemical Society, will be our special guest speaker at the awards dinner.

The Awards Committee greatly appreciates the efforts involved in nominating someone, and wishes to thank you for helping to recognize deserving students, colleagues, and educators in our local section. Please pass this information along to anyone involved in our local science programs!

50 Years Ago, *The Midland Chemist* 1967, 3, No. 8 (Feb.), 4.

In *Letters* by Gerald D. Mercer, Cellulose Research Group, Dow Chemical: “Dear Sir:

I would like to suggest that the Midland Section of the American Chemical Society and the chairman of the committee for the distribution of Fall and Spring Scientific Meeting programs study or find a method for assuring all Dow and Dow Corning technical personnel of an advanced copy of the meeting program.

Personnel of this department (Cellulose Research Group) have not received copies of the programs for the last two meetings, and as a consequence few, if any, have attended the meetings.”

40 Years Ago, *The Midland Chemist* 1977, 14, No. 1, 13.

In *Board Members Faint at Recent Meeting* by Marcia Dilling, Director, Midland Section: “It almost happened, as *Midland Chemist* Editor Jim Espy and two of his staff members, Treasurer Loren Severs and Business Manager Paul Cranley, presented an account of the publication’s expenditures and income for 1976 at last month’s regular board meeting. Although the board had allotted \$1800.00 for *The Midland Chemist* in 1976, Espy and his crew spent only about \$900.00. How was this wizardry accomplished when in recent years the publication usually has been over its budget? This improvement in financial status resulted from Espy’s and Cranley’s aggressive gathering of new advertisers, from increasing the advertising rates to levels higher than those of any other current local section ACS publication, and from trimming nonessentials from the magazine.”

30 Years Ago, *The Midland Chemist* 1987, 24, No. 1, 3.

In *Chairman’s Corner* by George Eastland, Chairman, Midland Section ACS, 1987: “I, like the chairmen-elect before me, attended the annual Conference for Officers of Large Local Sections, held in November, in Arlington, VA. There were thirty sections represented. It was a very good meeting and I learned a lot. I will be telling you more about what I learned in subsequent articles.

One thing which I want to mention this time concerns Chemistry Day, which is scheduled for November 6 (a Friday). The national office is quite hopeful that the local sections will do all that they can to make the day a real success (it doesn’t have to be a “day” – it can be a whole week). By the time that you read this I will have proposed to the Board of Directors that we form a committee to begin plans for the event. Coming as it does, in early November, we might be able to include the Fall Scientific Meeting as a part of the festivities. It is a great opportunity to show the public the good side of chemistry. I have always been proud to be a chemist and am distressed when it seems that chemistry is so often equated, in the public eye, with Love Canal, Bhopal, and pollution of the Rhine River.”

20 Years Ago, *The Midland Chemist* 1997, 34, No. 2, 8.
